## Top Tips



Things you could do at home with your child:

- Reading regularly at home by sharing books, magazines, and newspapers with your child.
- Recognising money, calculating pocket money, recognising the cost of basic food items. Explore which 2D and 3D shapes you can find around your home and on days out.
- Practice writing your address and telephone number.
- Reinforce the Thriftwood Code and identify ways to be a good citizen
- Discuss being healthy - healthy food, a balanced diet and regular exercise
- Help your child to make choices about the appropriate clothing needed at school to match the weather.

### Activities:

- Design safety signs for the workshop and café.
- Make a safety box to safely store away items.
- Design a safety slogan that can be printed.
- Café skills (staying safe in a kitchen/ keeping clean and tidy.)
