

What does Macbeth mean when he says this?

Accept any reasonable answers that include the contrast between 'foul' and 'fair', such as: I think Macbeth's statement means he has never experienced such a bad yet also good day before.

2. Shakespeare uses words like 'withered' and 'wild' to describe the characters Banquo is looking at. What impression does this give the reader?

Using the words 'withered' and 'wild' gives the reader the impression that the characters look scruffy, unkempt and old.

3. Can you think of an alternative way of saying 'forbid'?

Accept any reasonable answers that mean the same as 'forbid', such as: do not allow

4. Why does Banquo think that the characters he has met are not women?

The characters are described as having beards. This makes Banquo think that they are not women.
