

Pupil Premium and Covid response Proposed Grant Expenditure 2019-2022

What is the Pupil Premium?

The government considers the Pupil Premium (PP) to be a key element of their education policy. Introduced in April 2011, the Pupil Premium provides additional funding to schools to target specific groups of children who are vulnerable to underachievement. These include pupils from low income families and children in care. Children eligible for Pupil Premium are classed as 'Ever 6'; those who are, or have been receiving free school meals within the past six years, are entitled to a Pupil Premium Grant (PPG) of £1,345 (primary aged children) and £955 (for Years 7 and above). Children in Care (CIC) and those in adoptive families are entitled to a PPG of £2345 and Service Children to a PPG of £300.

What are the aims of the Pupil Premium?

The purpose of the Pupil Premium is to raise the achievement and aspirations of disadvantaged groups of children. The link between free school meal eligibility and under-achievement is strong. The Pupil Premium seeks to tackle this inequality in educational outcomes. The Premium is intended to help schools to provide targeted support to improve the life chances of children from lower income families and young people who face additional challenges in their lives, so that they can reach their full potential.

Barriers to Learning

These are identified through teachers' assessment, discussion with families and our understanding of our school community.

- Low social and emotional wellbeing; low self-worth, low confidence, previous experience of failure, low motivation
- Families requiring additional support financially to enable pupils to fully access the curriculum (signposting to key agencies, management of pupils' behaviour through boundary setting / routine)
- Weak communication skills (expressive and receptive)
- Specific disabilities; need for appropriate environment and trained staff to support need

Who is eligible?

It is important to apply for free school meals if you are eligible, to ensure school receives the Pupil Premium grant, as it should have a positive effect on your child's time in school, for at least the next six years. Your child may be able to get free school meals if you receive any of the following:



- Income Support
- Income-based Jobseekers Allowance
- Income-related Employment and Support Allowance
- Support under Part VI of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999
- The guaranteed element of State Pension Credit Child Tax Credit (provided you're not also entitled to Working Tax Credit and have an annual gross income of no more than £16,190)
- Working Tax Credit run-on paid for 4 weeks after you stop qualifying for Working Tax Credit ¬ Universal Credit

How is the Pupil Premium used at Thriftwood?

The Government has given schools discretion in how to best use the funding to meet the needs of their children. This may include helping towards the cost of trips and residential visits, one to one support, staff professional development, mentoring or purchasing resources and interventions. As a school, we are required to keep track of Pupil Premium spending and its impact. This report details our strategy over a 3 year period and the intended impact it has had on the outcomes for our Pupil Premium children and other vulnerable groups. We combine the Pupil Premium Grant with the Covid-19 catch-up premium.

Sensory occupational therapist advice / resources Approximate annual cost: £6,000	Increased staff knowledge on sensory techniques to support pupils on a daily basis. Appropriate resources to support sensory needs. Pupils' sensory needs assessed and a report written to enable staff to meet needs, helping child to calm and prepare for learning.	A large number of students have received an individual sensory therapy report, highlighting their sensory needs. Sensory programme have been designed for use within school to ensure that individual needs are met and pupils are ready to learn.
Staff training (Lego Therapy) Approximate annual cost: £1,000	Improve social skills of children with ASD (specifically development of listening skills, turn taking, joint attention, resilience, patience, perseverance and problem solving)	Lego therapy aims to develop social communication skills in autistic children, such as sharing, turn-taking, following rules, using names and problem-solving.
Staff supervision Approximate annual cost: £1,000	Improve wellbeing and mental health of staff. Giving all staff members the opportunity to engage with a counsellor.	There are expected to be personal, emotional and psychological benefits to staff's overall wellbeing. Supervision can help staff feel appreciated, supported, reassured and validated as well as giving them the opportunity to talk openly and honestly about how they are feeling. It will allow individuals to offload and air frustrations without being judged, as well as supporting and developing increased emotional intelligence and self-awareness.



Communications consultant Approximate annual cost: £2,000	Improve speech, language and communication of children displaying difficulties in these areas.	The consultant observes current practice and gives feedback to improve general teaching to develop the communication and language skills of all students. CPD is delivered to help staff implement effective strategies. Support is given to develop programmes for groups of targeted students.
Boxing Fitness Approximate annual cost: £2,500	Students will have a personal toolbox of strategies to manage anxiety, anger and other behaviours.	This physical intervention aims to develop the resilience of students. They will be working with a positive, male role model who as well as providing physical fitness will also fulfil a mentoring role. Students will learn strategies to help them manage anxiety, anger and other behaviours.
Speech & Language Resources £800	Improve speech & language skills of students	Additional speech and language resources such as 'Boardmarker' (software programme). These will be used to run speech and language interventions. Students will improve their speech and language skills which will help them to access the curriculum more effectively.
Additional sensory resources £3,000	Support pupils sensory needs	Provide increased resources both indoors and outside to support pupils sensory needs, alleviating stress and calming.
