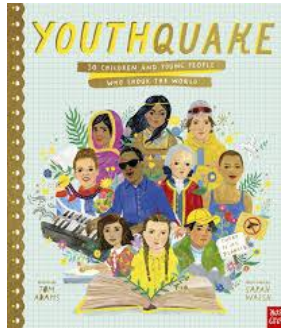


English

In English lessons we will be reading the book 'Youth Quake', learning about extraordinary children and young people from around the world who have overcome adversity and fought for what they believe in. We will explore topics of diversity and equality through our discussions and presentations. Our writing will focus on features of fact files, timelines and biographies as well as core handwriting and sentence composition skills. Towards the end of the term, learners will use their knowledge to create and write their own biography of an individual who is inspirational to them.



Each morning, we work on communication, language and literacy (CLL) skills. As part of this learners will read and practise their weekly spellings. Your help in supporting your child with these essential life skills at home will be really helpful.

Careers

Learners will continue to build on their understanding of the world of work and various employment families. They will hear from people in a range of job families and have opportunities throughout the year to experience different workplaces. In January learners will begin to create their own Vocational Profile, thinking about their own interests, skills and strengths. They will develop teamwork skills and practise appropriate workplace behaviours through various enterprise projects and workshops.

Other parts of our curriculum include:

- Weekly *Computing* lessons
- Weekly *PSHCE* lessons
- Fortnightly *Cookery* lessons
- Outdoor learning and community visits
- Independence and life skills
- *Travel Training*

Maths

In Maths pupils will continue to develop their understanding of number and place value. They will build on their knowledge of the four operations and begin to apply this to practical problems. Across the year there will be a strong focus on using money, telling the time and using measures (length, weight, capacity) in practical ways relevant to everyday life.

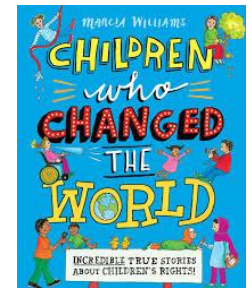


Science

In Science we will learn about Forces. Attractive forces (Magnetism & Gravity) as well as push and pull forces.

Topic

We will think about the human rights that they fought for and the impact that they have had on people and communities. Exploring themes such as: disability activists, homelessness, women's rights and environmental activists.
